Henri Couturier, painter of Leiden, merchant in New Amstel and New Amsterdam.

Couturier was born in Leyden, the birthplace of Rembrandt. On Couturier's marriage certificate his occupation was that of "schilder" (painter). Ten months later he is listed on a document as a "a grosgrain cloth manufacturer (groff greysnreder)". Since his first child was born about this time, he probably needed a steady source of income. That he actually was a painter is shown by his becoming an "original member" of the Leyden St. Luke's guild.

P 16, From what I can learn respecting my grandmother Clay [Ann Curtis Clay], she must have been a woman of strong intellect and agreeable conversation. She possessed a business talent, enabling her to manage her property well and support her family during the revolutionary war, but was destitute of that extreme sensibility and tenderness of feeling that characterized my mother. It might have been from the circumstances in which she was placed. She was at that time a widow, her husband, Slator Clay, having died in 1767. As no goods were imported for some time previous to the war, articles of clothing were expensive and often difficult to obtain, and frequently people cut up what they could spare in the household to make garments...I have often regretted that my grandmother's house was destroyed in the fire of 1824. I would like to view again the room my mother once showed me where my grandmother used to sit and read and write and adjust her accounts; and the large attic room, called Mount Racket, where the children were allowed to play and make as much noise as they pleased.

Where did Gen. Thomas grow up in New Castle?

He was born in 1804 in New Castle to Evan Thomas, Esq. (1763-1836) who emigrated from Wales. They were apparently unrelated to Charles Thomas (of the current Episcopal parish house at The Strand & Harmony). He is shown in the census for NC from 1800-1830.

The Latrobe map of 1804-5 shows a brick "Thomas" house as the left half of a duplex a few feet from modern Plum Alley. This may be 136 E 2nd (Terry Gormley) but it needs to be checked out with title chains.



The N.H.R. inventory describes 134-138 E 2nd as "late 1700's". Note Georgian/Federal features: fan light or square transom, gabled roof, flemish bond, mostly symmetrical except for one door/alley.


Erik Björk was one of the three Church of Sweden priests sent to America in 1697 to revive the churches and serve the remaining Swedes on the Delaware.

While initially pastor at Crane Hook, he supervised construction of Holy Trinity (Old Swedes') Church in Wilmington and was pastor there from 1697 until 1713.

Portraits of him and his wife Christina Stalcop were painted by Gustaf Hesselius around 1712.
